1 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

2 This is Immigration Judge Kevin Riley conducting removal proceedings in Los  
3 Angeles, California. Today's date is September 30, 2015. We are here in the matter of  
4 (b) (6). The respondent is present. He  
5 is unrepresented.

6 JUDGE TO MR. KHAN

7 Representing the Department today is?

8 MR. KHAN TO JUDGE

9 Answer Khan.

10 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

11 Good morning, sir.

12 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

13 Good morning, Your Honor.

14 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

15 Okay. We continued your case for a judicial competency inquiry, in the event  
16 you did not find an attorney. Have you found an attorney to assist you?

17 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

18 No, sir.

19 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

20 Okay. So you still representing yourself?

21 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

22 Yes, Your Honor.

23 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

24 Okay. So previously the Board did remand the matter to assess your  
25 competency to represent yourself. The Board issued a remand order on August 7,

1 2015, instructing the Judge to assess the respondent's mental competency, in the first  
2 instance, and to apply the standard set forth in Matter of M-A-M-. So we're going to  
3 conduct a judicial competency inquiry today under the provisions of the Franco-  
4 Gonzales order. So initially, I'm going to go over your rights in the proceeding. I'm also  
5 going to explain to you the allegations and charge and then I'm going to receive  
6 information from you through questions or if you have any documents or if the  
7 Department has any documents, to assess your competency to represent yourself or to  
8 determine whether or not you need any assistance. So you are in removal proceedings.  
9 The Department of Homeland Security has filed a Notice to Appear in your case. That  
10 document sets forth the reasons why the Department believes you can be removed  
11 from the United States. The purpose of the hearing is to determine whether or not you  
12 are subject to removal, and if you are found to be subject to removal, to determine what  
13 applications, if any, you're eligible to make. Some applications, if granted, would allow  
14 you to remain in the United States. Others would allow you to depart voluntarily, rather  
15 than under an order of removal. During your hearing, you have several rights, one of  
16 which is the right to be represented by an attorney, at no expense to the Government.  
17 Previously you were provided a copy of the legal aid list. Now you also have the right to  
18 present evidence. Evidence includes your testimony, it includes the testimony of others.  
19 You may also submit documents or other objects. The Department of Homeland  
20 Security may also present evidence and the evidence the Department presents, you  
21 have the right to examine that evidence. So if the Department calls any witnesses, you  
22 have the right to question those witnesses. If the Department submits any documents,  
23 you'll receive a copy of those documents and be provided time to review them. If there  
24 is any reason you believe I should not consider the Department's evidence, you have  
25 the right to object to it and to tell me the reasons why you believe it should not be

1 considered, and then I'll make a decision on whether or not it is admissible in your case.  
2 After I receive all of the evidence, I'll make a decision. If you disagree with the decision  
3 I make, you have the right to appeal to a higher court known as the Board of  
4 Immigration Appeals, and we'll provide you the appeal forms, if necessary. So  
5 previously you were served a copy of the Notice to Appear. It was previously marked  
6 into the record. I'm going to go over the allegations, as well as the charge, to make sure  
7 you understand why the Department is seeking your removal. I understand it's been  
8 probably about a year and a half since it was served on you. So the Department  
9 alleges that you are not a citizen or national of the United States and they state you're a  
10 native of the Philippines and a citizen of Philippines. They state on or about October  
11 22, 1996, you sought admission to the United States at the Los Angeles International  
12 Airport Port of Entry. They further you allege that you were not then in possession of a  
13 valid, unexpired immigrant visa, reentry permit, border crossing identification card or  
14 other valid entry document. They further allege that on or about October 22, 1996, you  
15 were paroled into the United States under Section 212(d)(5) of the Act. Now, because  
16 of that, the Department has charged that you can be removed, in that you are an  
17 immigrant who, at the time of application for admission, is not in possession of a valid,  
18 unexpired immigrant visa, reentry permit, border crossing card or other valid entry  
19 document. Okay. So I'm going to give you an additional advisal at this time before I  
20 start asking you questions for the judicial competency inquiry. I am an Immigration  
21 Judge. My job is to decide whether you'll be allowed to stay in the United States. I'm  
22 going to hold a hearing to gather information from you and from the representative of  
23 the Government to help me decide whether you'll be allowed to stay in the U.S. It is  
24 important that you understand what is happening in court. It is important you  
25 understand what is being said about you. It is also important that you're able to tell your

1 side of the story. To make sure that you're able to understand and tell your story, I'm  
2 going to ask questions about you and your case. I will use this information to decide  
3 whether you will need any special help in your hearing. Can you explain to me what I  
4 just said in your own words?

5 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

6 Judge, if I could, I could be -- I could be deport and the Government's thinking,  
7 they're -- giving evidences against me.

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 Okay. Do we have any questions before we begin?

10 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

11 No, Your Honor.

12 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

13 Okay. So again, I'm going to ask you several questions about you and your  
14 case. Initially, how are you feeling today?

15 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

16 It's good, Your Honor. Thank you.

17 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

18 And could you please state your full name?

19 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

20 (b) (6).

21 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

22 And do you know what today's date is?

23 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

24 Today is September [indiscernible] -- September 30th.

25 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

1 Of what year?

2 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

3 2015.

4 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

5 And do you know what city we are in today?

6 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

7 That was Los Angeles.

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 And how did you get to court today?

10 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

11 With a van.

12 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

13 Okay. And where did the van pick you up at?

14 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

15 At Santa Ana Jail.

16 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

17 Okay. That's where you're currently detained, at Santa Ana Jail?

18 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

19 Yes. Correct, Your Honor.

20 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

21 Do you recall how you came to the United States?

22 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

23 By plane.

24 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

25 And where did you board the plane at?

1 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

2 I'm sorry, say that again, sir?

3 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

4 Where did you get on the plane at? What city?

5 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

6 Los Angeles.

7 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

8 You got on the plane to come to the U.S. in Los Angeles?

9 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

10 Yes, Your Honor.

11 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

12 Well, where was the plane flying to?

13 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

14 Here in Los Angeles.

15 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

16 Okay. So where did the flight start from?

17 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

18 From Manila, Gustapio [phonetic sp.] from Tokyo to Los Angeles.

19 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

20 Do you recall what year it was you came to the U.S.?

21 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

22 I believe it was 1996.

23 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

24 All right. So how long, approximately, have you been here in the U.S.?

25 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

1 Like I believe, like, 20 years already.

2 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

3 Do you want to stay in the United States?

4 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

5 Yes, Your Honor.

6 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

7 And before you were taken into custody, where were you living?

8 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

9 In Los Angeles.

10 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

11 Were you living with anybody in Los Angeles?

12 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

13 By myself.

14 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

15 Do you recall what street you were living on?

16 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

17 (b) (6) Street.

18 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

19 What's the highest level of school you completed?

20 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

21 In college, Your Honor.

22 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

23 What college did you attend?

24 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

25 St. Jude's College.



1 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

2 And where is that located?

3 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

4 It's located Sampaloc, Manila.

5 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

6 Are you currently seeing a doctor or taking any medication?

7 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

8 Yes, Your Honor.

9 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

10 When did you last see a doctor?

11 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

12 I believe last month.

13 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

14 And are you taking medication?

15 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

16 Yes, Your Honor.

17 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

18 And what are you taking medication for?

19 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

20 I'm taking medication for my heart and for mental, but I don't really remember  
21 what medication I'm taking.

22 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

23 Okay. You said you're taking it for your heart and also mental?

24 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

25 Yeah.

1 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

2 What type of mental problems or issues do you have?

3 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

4 Oh, I was diagnosed bipolar and major depressive disorder, with manic -- anxiety  
5 and panic and anxiety attack.

6 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

7 And when were you first diagnosed with any of those disorders?

8 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

9 The first time I was diagnosed with major depressive syndrome is I don't really  
10 remember when, but last year I was diagnosed in Santa Ana Facility.

11 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

12 So that was the first time that you were ever diagnosed with a mental disorder --

13 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

14 Yes --

15 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

16 -- last year?

17 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

18 Yes, Your Honor.

19 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

20 Other than the medication, do you have any other treatment?

21 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

22 I believe that's about it.

23 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

24 How often do you see the doctor?

25 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

1 Every month.

2 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

3 Is it a specific type of doctor or --

4 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

5 It's a psychiatrist doctor.

6 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

7 Psychiatrist?

8 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

9 Yes, sir.

10 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

11 Now, prior to your diagnosis last year with major depressive disorder, had you  
12 ever previously seen a psychiatrist or psychologist?

13 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

14 Yes, Your Honor.

15 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

16 When was the first time you saw one of those types of doctors?

17 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

18 Usually -- usually every month, but if you have -- if I have something like I'm  
19 having anxiety and depressed and -- I could see the doctor any time.

20 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

21 Okay. But was last year the first time you ever saw a psychiatrist or  
22 psychologist?

23 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

24 Yes, sir.

25 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

1 Now, do you know why the Immigration officers picked you up?

2 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

3 Because of my conviction.

4 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

5 And what were you convicted of?

6 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

7 Possession -- from drugs [indiscernible] and petty theft [indiscernible].

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 And what kind of controlled substance?

10 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

11 Methamphetamine.

12 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

13 Do you recall where you were arrested?

14 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

15 I was in Los Angeles.

16 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

17 When Immigration arrested you, were you at jail or at your home or --

18 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

19 In -- I'm not home.

20 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

21 Did they get you at the jail when you were being released or --

22 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

23 Yes, Your Honor.

24 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

25 And do you recall when it was that Immigration arrested you?

1 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

2 I don't remember anymore.

3 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

4 Can you explain to me the Immigration charge against you?

5 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

6 I was not a citizen. I carry an expired visa or whatever. And the possession of  
7 personal controlled substance and the petty theft.

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 Okay. Is there anything important that you think I should know about what they  
10 say you did wrong?

11 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

12 No, I don't, Your Honor.

13 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

14 Do you agree with what the Government is saying about you?

15 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

16 Yes, Your Honor.

17 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

18 How do you plan to proceed in court or what do you plan to do next with your  
19 hearing?

20 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

21 I just -- just continue the court proceeding without a lawyer.

22 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

23 And what do you hope happens in court?

24 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

25 What happened in the court is the judge will decide if I could be, if I could be

1 deport and same thing with a judge -- the Government is giving some convictions  
2 against me for me to get deported --

3 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

4 Well, you understand then that deportation is one of the possible outcomes of the  
5 hearing?

6 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

7 Yes, Your Honor.

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 Are there any other possible outcomes of the removal hearing?

10 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

11 I wouldn't know --

12 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

13 So earlier today we reviewed your rights in the Immigration proceeding. What  
14 are your rights in the Immigration proceedings?

15 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

16 I don't really know, Your Honor.

17 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

18 Okay. Well, do you know what a legal representative is?

19 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

20 A lawyer.

21 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

22 And what does a lawyer do in court?

23 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

24 Helping in my case.

25 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

1 Are you allowed to have a lawyer in your case?

2 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

3 I believe so, Your Honor, yes.

4 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

5 And you indicated, have you tried to find a lawyer?

6 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

7 I'm trying to find one, but I couldn't find one.

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 And what did you do to try and find a lawyer?

10 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

11 I made a pro bono letter.

12 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

13 You contacted the people on the pro bono list?

14 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

15 Sometimes.

16 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

17 And how did you contact them?

18 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

19 Telephone in the facility.

20 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

21 Is there anyone who can help you with your case?

22 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

23 Right now I don't -- doing my, getting, making ready all my paperworks,  
24 somebody in the detention helping me to do my paperwork.

25 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

1 Okay. So one of the other --

2 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

3 Yes, Your Honor.

4 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

5 -- individuals at the facility helps you? What is evidence?

6 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

7 Evidence? Proof.

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 Okay. And can you give me an example of evidence that could be offered to  
10 prove that --

11 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

12 Anything. Report from the Human Rights, something like that, and current,  
13 current issues about eligibility.

14 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

15 About what?

16 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

17 About eligibility in the --

18 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

19 Oh, okay. What is an appeal?

20 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

21 Appeal is if I get, if I lose the case, I could appeal it to the higher court.

22 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

23 And how would you file an appeal?

24 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

25 By fill out the applications and I send them.



1 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

2 Did you do that in the past?

3 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

4 Yes, Your Honor.

5 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

6 What does relief from removal mean?

7 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

8 Relief, anything that could, I could apply. Like I-589 and also I have applied -- I  
9 have a I-914. It's on processing right now.

10 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

11 Okay. Do you have any family in the U.S.?

12 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

13 Yes, Your Honor.

14 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

15 What family do you have in the U.S.?

16 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

17 My -- all my cousins and -- cousins.

18 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

19 Do any of your cousins have legal status in the U.S.?

20 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

21 Yes, Your Honor. They are U.S. citizen.

22 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

23 Has anyone harmed you in the past in your country?

24 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

25 Yes, Your Honor.

1 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

2 And are you afraid to go back to your country?

3 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

4 Yes, Your Honor. I'm afraid to go back -- on my country.

5 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

6 So earlier you indicated you thought I-589 as possible relief. So do you know  
7 what asylum means?

8 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

9 Yes, Your Honor.

10 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

11 And what does that mean?

12 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

13 For the people coming over here in America apply for asylum -- know that are  
14 people, like, harming them in their home country and they want to get asylum in  
15 America.

16 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

17 And previously you filled out the I-589?

18 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

19 Yes, Your Honor.

20 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

21 Is there anything else you'd like to tell me?

22 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

23 Nothing so far.

24 JUDGE TO MR. KHAN

25 Mr. Khan, anything from the Department?

1 MR. KHAN TO JUDGE

2 I do have -- the prior TA, Sung Park, was able to obtain the medical records.

3 May I approach at this --

4 JUDGE TO MR. KHAN

5 Okay.

6 MR. KHAN TO JUDGE

7 Serving --

8 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

9 Okay, sir, so the Department just served a large number of records related to you  
10 and your medical care at the facility. I'm going to mark these as Exhibit C-1, as they  
11 relate to the competency issue, since we're conducting the judicial competency inquiry.  
12 Do you want some time to review these documents?

13 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

14 Yes, Your Honor.

15 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

16 Okay. So we'll go off the record. We'll take some time so you can review them.  
17 I'll review them and then we'll come back and continue with the hearing. Okay?

18 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

19 Off the record.

20 [OFF THE RECORD]

21 [ON THE RECORD]

22 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

23 Okay. We are back on the record. It is still September 30, 2015.

24 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

25 So sir, we took a break so you could review the medical records submitted by the

1 Department. Did you have enough time to review those?

2 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

3 Yes, Your Honor.

4 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

5 Okay. So I'm going to admit those as Exhibit C-1. In reviewing the records, I do  
6 note that the records relate to many medical issues, including mental health issues,  
7 noting that you're taking Benadryl for sleep problems, that you have seen mental health  
8 nurses, as well as the psychiatrist, due to issues. You've also been treated for lumbar  
9 spine issues, dental issues. There is also mental health evaluation progress reports  
10 from May through September of 2014, noting you're fully oriented, sick call forms with  
11 issues ranging from pimples and cysts, as well as the psychiatric issues. There's also a  
12 psychiatric progress report recently, from August 20th of 2015, by Dr. (b) (6) [phonetic  
13 sp.], a psychiatrist, who notes there is a follow-up appointment scheduled for October  
14 13th of 2015, who notes that your psychomotor functions are normal, you have an  
15 appropriate thought process. So I have reviewed those materials and considered them  
16 as well. Anything else you want to tell me on the issue of your competence?

17 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

18 Not insofar, Your Honor.

19 JUDGE TO MR. KHAN

20 Okay. Mr. Khan, anything else from the Department?

21 MR. KHAN TO JUDGE

22 Nothing, Your Honor.

23 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

24 Okay. So sir, I am going to find that you are competent to represent yourself.  
25 There's no reasonable cause to believe that you're incompetent. There are mental

1 health issues. The medical records, as well as your own testimony, notes you're being  
2 treated for a variety of issues; bipolar, major depressive disorder, anxiety. But as noted  
3 by the psychiatrist, your motor functions are appropriate, your thought processes are  
4 appropriate, your psychomotor functioning is normal. And I do find that you have a  
5 rational and factual understanding of the nature of the proceedings, the object of the  
6 proceedings. You're able to meaningfully participate. You understand your rights.  
7 You're able to assert those rights. You've discussed applications you've made,  
8 applications you have pending. You understand how you came into proceedings, why  
9 you're in proceedings, criminal history, as well as just personal history in coming to the  
10 U.S. So I'm going to issue a decision on the competency issue. Then, after we've  
11 finished that, we'll resume the normal course of your removal proceedings. Do you  
12 understand?

13 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

14 Yes, Your Honor.

15 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

16 Okay.

17 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

18 So, I am going to issue a interim decision on the competency issue.

19 JUDGE RENDERS ORAL DECISION

20 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

21 Okay. Sir, so I issued an oral decision on the competency issue. I have found  
22 you competent to represent yourself. Now, with that finding, we can go ahead and  
23 proceed with your hearing. Would you like some more time to continue to look for an  
24 attorney before we do anything else in your case?

25 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

1 Yes, Your Honor. Yes, Your Honor.

2 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

3 Okay. So I'll continue your case to give you time to look for an attorney. I'll  
4 continue your case to October 13th at 8:00.

5 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

6 Okay.

7 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

8 That'll give you about two weeks to look for an attorney.

9 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

10 Okay.

11 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

12 And you still have a copy of the legal aid list?

13 MR. (b) (6) TO JUDGE

14 Yes, Your Honor.

15 JUDGE TO MR. (b) (6)

16 Okay.

17 JUDGE TO MR. KHAN

18 Anything from the Department?

19 MR. KHAN TO JUDGE

20 Nothing, Your Honor.

21 JUDGE FOR THE RECORD

22 Okay. Both parties will receive a copy of the notice of the next hearing date,  
23 October 13th, to give you time to look for an attorney. And this hearing is adjourned.
